### The Purpose of this Service

We come from many places and are of different colors, genders, dress, political views, and faiths—but today we gather here because we share a common bond of humanity and the hope and passion for justice and peace. Our prayers are for peace and justice wherever they are needed—in homes, communities, the workplace, the nation and the world, as well for inner peace that dwells in our hearts. We give thanks that you have joined us to raise your own prayers, hopes and actions to create a more peaceful and just world for all.



## What is Prayer?

Prayer means many things to many people. We offer a simple broad statement that may be helpful as you think about prayer:

Prayer requires no consecrated edifice and no appointed hour. Indeed it needs no words or forms fixed and eternal. Prayer is a step on which we rise from the self we are to the self we wish to be. Prayer is not an escape from duty. It is no substitute for the deed. Prayer seeks the power to do wisely, to act generously, to live helpfully. Prayer takes us beyond the self. Joining our little self to the selfhood of humanity, it gives our wishes the freedom to grow large and broad and inclusive. Our prayers are answered not when we are given what we ask, but when we are challenged to be what we can be. (Rabbi Morris Adler, adapted)

### What is Peace?

The definition of peace is as elusive as that of prayer. Here is one concept:

Peace is more than the absence of war. **Peace Women Across the Globe** has concluded that peace is best understood in terms of "human security," which encompasses much more than state security. It is the combination of: Economic security (having an assured basic income); Food security (physical and economic access to food); Health security (access to basic healthcare); Environmental security (access to clean water, clean air, ecological integrity); Personal security (freedom from physical violence and threats, right to human dignity and freedom of person); Community security (cultural integrity); and Political security (protection of civil rights and freedoms and responsibilities). # Pennsylvania's Heritage

The friendship between me and you I will not compare to a chain; for that the rains might rust, or the falling tree might break. We are the same as if one man's body were to be divided into two parts, we are all one flesh and blood.

--William Penn

The sentiment expressed by these words embodies what writer Jim Powell described in an article reprinted on *quaker.org*: "During the late seventeenth century, when Protestants persecuted Catholics, Catholics persecuted Protestants, and both persecuted Quakers and Jews, (William) Penn established an American sanctuary which protected freedom of conscience." Pennsylvanians have a long and proud history of goodwill toward the prayers and religious practices of individuals of many faiths. We are fortunate to continue this tradition

here in the twenty-first century. The representatives of the faith traditions offering prayers here today represent but a fraction of the hundreds of faiths followed by Pennsylvanians from across the Commonwealth.
